Her goal was to dwell continually in the roaring fire of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, but to do so in a way that was hidden and not outwardly pretentious or spectacular. She is an ideal guide for those of us who are working in the secular world and seeking to transform it from within. For this newsletter's meditation, I am allowing her simple, yet

challenging, maxims to speak to you. If you follow them, who knows how they might transform you?

The Easter season is about the transformation of life. God desires to transform us continually, moving from glory to glory, culminating in our glorified nature in Heaven, but even the rest of nature will be mysteriously perfected and made new. This thought came to mind while I was reading CS Lewis's *The Great Divorce*, which is an allegory of Hell, Purgatory, and Heaven. He masterfully illustrates a glorified Heaven and Earth where even humble stones, streams, and birds bring his soul to rapture. While I was sitting in my backyard at sunset, pondering these things, I heard the rough call of seagulls behind me, flying high above. I looked up and saw with great wonder how their bellies and wings had become gold against a peerless cobalt sky. Those common, squawking, unspectacular birds became magnificent and eternal.

May this Easter season bring you to transformation! Please pray it does the same for me!
